

Reading from an early age and securing phonics

- Reading from an early age is important as research shows that if children are not secure and fluent readers by Year 2, it is very difficult to then develop a love of reading going forward.
- In order to get children fluent in reading, their phonic knowledge must be embedded within EYFS and KS1.
- Read to children from day zero!

Brain Development

Babies are born learning. From birth to age 3 are critical years for the development of language skills that are foundational for future learning success.

Parents are a child's first and most important teacher.

Knowledge

Books are a pleasure, yes, and they are also informative. You and your child can learn something new when you read aloud.



Why Read Aloud?

Language

The number of words that a child knows when he or she enters kindergarten is the most important predictor of a child's success or failure.

Reading aloud grows your child's vocabulary and introduces many words and concepts that you might not use in everyday conversation.

Love of Reading

Parents that read aloud demonstrate that reading is important, that reading is pleasurable, that reading is valued.

Bonding

Is there anything better than sharing a good book with a child in your lap?

Literacy Skills

Vocabulary. Phonics. Familiarity with the printed word. Storytelling. Comprehension.

Reading aloud is invaluable for building literacy skills.

What is Phonics?

Phonics is the link between the words we read/say and the letters that represent each sound.

Phonics Terminology

Phoneme - A single spoken sound, e.g. /c/

Grapheme - A grapheme is a letter or a sequence of letters that represent a phoneme/sound.


Phoneme/Grapheme Correspondance - match a phoneme (sound) to a grapheme (written representation)

Segment - Segmenting a word is to break the word down into its component phonemes, e.g. hat = h-a-t.


Blend - Blending letter sounds (phonemes) together enables children to decode and read words. For example, h-a-t = hat.







Reading and Books at Hillside

Children are given books precisely matched to their phonic attainment - this will be different for every child.

The time spent reading with your child should be a celebration of your child's reading - a chance to showcase their phonic expertise.








Why read each book 3 times?

- 1) Decoding
- 2) Fluency
- 3) Comprehension (Questions, predictions, characters feeling etc) and vocabulary.
- Prosody (intonation, volume, pitch, rhythm).








Once Phonics are Secure

Once children are secure in **all their phonic sounds**, can read fluently and are able to decode words independently, they will move onto colour banded books.







Once Phonics are Secure

At Hillside, our colour banded books are matched to the children's reading age.

Their reading age is assessed through an online tool. It assesses: the children's reading and their understanding of the text (comprehension). This then allows us to match a book to their reading age.

Like the phonics readers, coloured banded books should be able to be read fluently and the emphasis broadens to encompass more comprehension and vocabulary understanding.

Children's reading ages are reviewed throughout the year and their home reading books adjusted accordingly.



Reading at home Your child reading to you.

- 5 10 minutes daily
- Choose a time that works for you, get comfortable and free from distractions.
- Make it part of your routine.
- Be positive and celebrate successes
- Be patient and let them try and work it out...if they need help...then work it out together.


Remember your child is on an amazing journey to becoming a reader.

What is fluency and why is it important?

- For a child to be fluent, phonic knowledge is important.
- When a child is fluent, we can focus on understanding and comprehension.
- When comprehension is secure, the child will enjoy what they read.
- Secure phonics and fluency all reduce cognitive load.







Three ways you can help build fluency at home...

- 1. Read and follow the adult reads the text and the child follows along with their finger. This helps the child with word recognition and models to them how they should read with fluency.
- 2. My turn, your turn take turns reading a page or a paragraph. Here you are modelling how to read with fluency, flow and expression.
- 3. Echo Reading as you read, the child copies. It is important here to pace yourself and read at a rate that your child can keep up with.








Promoting a Reading Culture

It is important to foster a love for reading and encourage reading for pleasure.

- Spending quality time together.
- Modelling how to read a book tracking left to right, turning pages, identify title & illustrator.
- Asking questions about what has happened and characters' feelings.
- Explaining vocabulary
- Predicting what will happen next.
 How will the story end?
- Making connections personal links.
- Share your love of reading!



Reading at home You reading to your child

Your child is also encouraged to bring home a 'Love to Read' book

which is chosen each week by them from our book corners or school library.

This book is for **you to read to your child** and for you and your child to enjoy together.

By sharing this book together, you can further support your child by talking about the story, characters, exploring vocabulary and asking questions you will be

supporting their understanding, developing their comprehension skills and widening their vocabulary.
