



Headteacher Update

Today is my 100th day as Headteacher at Hillside and I have genuinely loved every minute! Our school is just incredible, ever day the children amaze me with their enthusiasm for learning and their hard work. The staff team continue to work incredible hard for the children. You, as parents and carers, have been fantastic and very supportive of the school and me, which is greatly appreciated. Our Academy Committee has also been working hard for the school.

Well, it has certainly been another busy week! Councillor Matthew Parker came to visit us during our assembly on Monday and presented us with a cheque for £250! This is going to go towards our Creative Media suite...more news to follow soon! On Tuesday, I went with Mrs Andrews and 20 excited Year 4's to visit the Verwood House Care home. The children sang Christmas songs and then spoke to some of the residents over squash and biscuits. It was a very rewarding experience and great to get out in the local community again. Yesterday, our children in Reception, Year I and 2 were visited by Fire Fighters and a Fire Engine and learnt about fire safety! All very exciting!

I would like to say another huge thank you to the PTA for organising and running such a fantastic Christmas Fayre and to everyone that was able to attend and made donations. In total we raised over £1,700 which is brilliant news!

This week we have had some cases of Strep A across the school and have taken guidance from the Health Protection Team to ensure we are taking all the necessary measures to keep our children safe. This is paramount for us, and I encourage you to read through the information below, if you haven't done so already. We have implemented extra controls in terms of cleaning across the school, reminding children to wash hands, catch it, bin it, kill it. I will of course write to you each day between now and the end of term to keep you updated on case numbers across the school.

As a result of the rise in cases yesterday I needed to take the decision to cancel the Celebration of Achievement afternoon. I am sorry, as I know a number of children were really keen to show of their home learning and work, but I felt this was the best decision. We will of course reschedule this for after Christmas. As things stand, I am keen to carry on with the Christmas performances next week and will monitor the situation carefully. There will be some extra control measures for you when you visit school and we will need you to sanitise your hands when you enter and exit the school.



Strep A WHAT THE ILLNESS LOOKS LIKE:

You can get more information	Symptoms include sore throat, headache, fever, feeling sick and vomiting. After 12-48 hours – the red rash with pinhead spots can develop. The spots can appear on the chest and stomach and may spread across the body. The skin may feel like sandpaper. You may also see a strawberry tongue and flushed cheeks. Anyone with suspected symptoms should speak to their GP. Antibiotics are usually issued.
here: Scarlet fever - NHS (www.nhs.uk)	Children need to stay off for 24 hours after starting antibiotics. If antibiotics are not prescribed by the GP children will need to stay away from your setting for 2-3 weeks as they may still be infectious.
	Cases who are still infectious (e.g. within first 24 hours of antibiotics or until fully recovered if antibiotics not taken) should avoid people in vulnerable groups. This includes people with chronic illness such as cancer or diabetes, who are immunocompromised, or who have had very recent influenza or chicken-pox infection. All suspected cases of scarlet fever should seek medical care, either via NHS 111 or their GP.
Impetigo	Impetigo is a skin infection. It will start with red sores or blisters. These will burst quickly and leave crusty, golden-brown patches. Anyone with signs of impetigo should speak to their GP. They should stay at home for two days (48 hours) after starting antibiotic treatment or until all lesions have crusted over / healed.
Strep Throat	Strep throat is an infection in the throat and tonsils caused by bacteria called group A Streptococcus (group A strep). It is spread by talking, coughing, or sneezing. It can only be diagnosed by swabbing the throat and running a test on the swab. Cases can attend the setting when they no longer have a fever AND have taken antibiotics for at least 24hrs.

COMPLICATIONS:

In very rare situations, GAS can cause a more serious infection (Invasive Group A Strep). This is when the bacteria get into parts of the body where it is not normally found, such as the lungs or bloodstream. Children who have Flu or chickenpox at the same time as a GAS infection are more likely to develop this serious infection. However, you can reduce the spread of all infections by practicing good hand and respiratory hygiene and other standard infection control measures.







Should I keep my

child off school?



Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over	
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode	
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19	
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics	
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared	
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started	
Scabies	they've had their first treatment	
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics	
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics
